Families sometimes move to Old Braeswood because they need a larger house to accommodate a growing family, but if they later need an even larger house, they most likely will not leave the neighborhood. People who move here do not want to leave. That was the case for Dr. Norman and Joy Speck.

Norman and Joy were native Texans with an infant son, Pat, when they bought their first house in Houston, shortly after Norman completed training as an orthodontist. Two more sons, Don and Mark, came along and they bought a house at 2201 Maroneal in about 1954 to have more room. A fourth son, Eric, arrived and soon they began to wish for even more space, so long as it was in Old Braeswood. They found their bigger house at 7506 Morningside, which they purchased in about 1965. And they have lived there ever since.

The Specks are only the third owners of the Morningside

house, designed by architect William Fred Gray.

The first owner was Leo M. Levy and wife Selma, who first appeared in the Houston City Directory at that address in 1937. Leo was listed as a representative for the Spanish American Trading Company. A maid, Elva Stewart, lived in the garage apartment. Soon Leo became a representative for The Edwin D. Shepherd Agency, general agents for the The Specks and the house at 7506 Morningside.

Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company of Hartford, Connecticut. He officed in the Esperson Building.

Leo died in 1944. Page one of the February 20, 1947 issue of *The Thresher*, a student weekly publication of the Rice Institute, announced a Leo M. Levy Memorial Fund established to make interest free short-term emergency loans to students in need. Selma remained in the house until 1948, and apparently assumed his position as representative for the Shepard Agency because she is listed that way in the City Directory.

The second owner was William H. Levy and his wife Edna, no relation to the first owners. They are first listed in the house in 1949, with their maid Bertha Jury in the garage apartment. Bill Levy had founded the first Rice Food Market on the then unpaved Rice Blvd. in 1937, naming it *Rice*

Boulevard Food Market. At the time, the only other store in what is now Rice Village was an ice house at Rice Blvd. and Kirby. A photograph of the entire Levy family taken in the den of 7506 Morningside was displayed in the Rice grocery store after they purchased the house from Leo Levy's widow.

When the Specks bought the house from the Rice Food Market Levys, they noticed that it had some unusual features. Like other

> houses in Old Braeswood, it had a very small front porch. The reason, they learned, was that the founding vision for Old Braeswood was of an upscale neighborhood, one where people did not loll around on the front porch for all to see. The small porches made sure that no one did that. The house also had a basement, unusual for Houston. The walls are metal lathe and plaster rather than the wooden lathe and plaster common at the time. Air condi-

tioning added in the 1950s came via a wooden cooling tower. The wooden tower, twice restored, is used by the Specks to this day.

The Rice Market Levys had been world travelers and they left behind some of their souvenirs. The tile fountain from India and the African light fixtures of copper and animal hide are gone today, victims of storms and humidity, but the crystal chandelier from Austria still hangs in the dining room.

Pat, the oldest son, now lives again with his parents to manage their care. Having first lived in Old Braeswood when he was about 5 years old, he can recall changes in the neighborhood.

In the 1950s, the area that is now Old Braeswood Park was undeveloped and there was some disagreement as to how it should be used. The neighborhood children wanted it as a ball field and the Braeswood Garden Club wanted it as a flower garden. Actually, there were many places to play ball, because OB had numerous vacant lots, especially on South Main. The two small triangles, one on Glen Haven at Morningside and one on Greenbriar at Blue Bonnet, both had goldfish ponds. Don Speck had a newspaper route and made one especially onerous delivery each day, bicycling Glenlee's long driveway to deliver a newspaper to Glenn and Faustine McCarthy on their estate.

No description of Old Braeswood in that era is complete without mention of the Shamrock Hotel. It was the place to be. Pat had his Lamar High School senior prom there.

Everyone remembers the Shamrock's swimming pool, big enough for water skiing demonstrations, but another unusual feature was its fallout shelter in the basement, complete with water and food in case of nuclear attack. During the Cuban missile crisis, the Speck children became alarmed. Their father reassured them that in case of attack they would all find shelter at the Shamrock. After that assurance, the stray cat the children hoped would be included in the shelter was dubbed "Cuba."

The Specks are a family of doctors. Don followed his father into orthodontics. Mark became a dentist. Pat became a physician in general practice. Only Eric followed a different path, becoming a vice president of American Airlines. That path began at the Shamrock. As a child, he retrieved discarded flight schedules and ticket envelopes from a travel agency operating in the hotel. He used them to concoct games to play with his brothers. By the time he was about 12 years old, his father decided to put Eric's knowledge of flight schedules to use and allowed him to plan the family's annual trips, always an adventure. Under Eric's young leadership they traveled to Hawaii, Guadalajara, Majorca, Mexico City, Rome and Paris.

Last year, the Specks celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary, noted at the time in this newsletter. Their life here has been a typical Old Braeswood story.

The Federal Projects Manager for the Harris County Flood Control District has communicated to the POA that the concrete sidewalk along North Braeswood west of South Main will be reduced to 8 feet from 10 feet in width. This will allow about 7 feet to plant trees in the area between the curb and sidewalk. Once the tree planting plans are prepared he will share them with our neighborhood.

RICE VILLAGE is undergoing a transformation and is bringing in a lot of new stores and restaurants. Unfortunately, this means that some favs like La Madeleine will be closing after 3/26. But Starbucks will reopen on the Amherst side of the same building in the former Chico's location in September. Shake Shack will reopen in the La Madeleine space in November.

On Morningside, parking spaces were removed to create an open-space plaza that stretches the length of the three restaurants on Morningside in front of D'Amico's Cafe, Nao Ramen, and Hopdoddy Burger Bar, and serves as a public gathering spot. Benches and public art now grace a spot on Kelvin. We are told that more pedestrian oriented changes are coming later in the year.

In late February, Rice Village also launched a paid parking program to improve access to favorite stores and eateries by way of parking meters. For those looking to shop, dine and stay for an extended period of time, you can park for up to two hours for free in the garage off Morningside (upper levels only). A portion of the proceeds from the parking meters will benefit Roberts Elementary. You can pay for the meters with a credit card. Rates are \$1.00-\$2.00 per hour. The good news is that suddenly there is plenty of available parking around the Village.

Old Braeswood Real Estate Report

Things are looking good for the Houston real estate market; single-family home sales and pricing are both climbing. The luxury market (\$750,000 and above) saw a fourth consecutive month of positive sales. There was a 4.0% increase in homes sold in Feb. 2017 compared to this time last year. Total dollar volume for all types of properties sold is up 13.1%.

Single-family home inventory is up 7.6% from this time last year. Old Braeswood is looking good as usual with one home already sold since January 1st. Total number of homes sold in our neighborhood in 2016 was 9 (listed on MLS).* With

Place your household garbage in the city provided automated bin or recycling containers, and set them on the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. the evening preceding pick up and no later than 7 a.m. the day of pick up, and remove it no later than 10 p.m. on collection day. Bins left on the street beyond these times are subject to city fines. Bins must be accessible to the automated collection truck (not blocked

by vehicles, trees, etc). Yard waste must be bagged in city approved biodegradable bags, weighing no more than 50 pounds, and placed at the curb at least 3' away from automated bins. Yard waste mixed with paper, plastic or any other type of waste will not be collected. Small branches may be put in bundles (no more than 4 ft. x 18 inches in diameter).

Kirby Mansion Event: 3/29

John H. Kirby played a key role in the formation of our neighborhood. Stephen Fox, in his book *Braeswood, An Architectural History*, writes that in 1927 the new Braeswood Corporation acquired the land on which our houses are built by buying 456.26 acres from John H. Kirby for \$733,731. Fox further writes that Kirby was one of the twelve directors of Braeswood Corporation. The rest, as they say, is history.

This month on March 29th from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. there is a rare opportunity to walk through John Kirby's 17,000 sq. ft. mansion built for him in 1926 at 2000 Smith St. The occasion is a fundraiser for The Houston Area Youth Council on Service, a nonprofit service organization for high school juniors and seniors in the greater Houston area. Tickets at the door are \$60.00. In addition to a tour of the mansion, admission includes food, drink and music. For more information call (832)309-5474.
