Your House Has a History

The houses at 2337 and 2329 Gramercy sit side-by-side and share a common history.

The first occupants of #2337, built in 1952, were E.L. Sheets, a developer, and his wife, Thelma. The first occupants of #2329 were Meyer Morris Gordon, founder of Gordon's Jewelers, and his wife, Ida.

Sheets built both houses. His own house was built to be his retirement home, although he continued to manage Bissonnet Plaza Apartments, which he had developed in 1946 on 10 acres south of I-59 between Edloe and Buffalo Speedway. The blueprints for those apartments are still in the attic of #2337.

No sooner had Sheets settled into Old Braeswood than Gordon asked Sheets to build a house for him. Sheets agreed on one condition, that the house be sited on the lot next door, so that *(Continued on Page 4)*

Old Braeswood Eagle Scout Spruces Up Braeswood Park

Marshall Gregory, a Senior at Lamar High School, did his Eagle Scout Project here in Old Braeswood where he grew up. On September 26, 2009, Marshall, 11 scouts, and 3 adult scout leaders from Troop 11 at First Presbyterian Church carried out his project, "Park Renovation", in Braeswood Park. The Scouts spread 180 bags of Kiddie Cushion and 120 bags of Houston Mulch. The Kiddie Cushion re-surfaced all three playground areas and the mulch was put down around all the trees. Marshall also painted the three entry gates to the Park and painted the two park signs. He was able to get the materials for his project donated from Living Earth Technology and Sherwin-Williams.

Boy Scout Troop 11 is the oldest Boy Scout Troop in Houston. It was first organized in 1914, and produced Houston's first Eagle Scout in 1916. First Presbyterian Church of Houston has been sponsoring Troop 11 since 1920. Over 140 Scouts have earned Eagle rank in Troop 11, including 50 in the last decade. Currently the top membership roster includes 83 Scouts and 55 trained adults. Only two percent of boy scouts ever go on to earn the rank of Eagle Scout. Certainly, Old Braeswood is proud to have another Eagle Scout, Marshall Gregory, in the neighborhood.

Old Braeswood Park Corporation wishes to extend a warm and heartfelt thanks to Marshall Gregory for his hard work and dedication to his own neighborhood in completing his Eagle Scout Project at Braeswood Park. The entry gates and signs look wonderful thanks to the fresh coat of paint, and the trees look better than ever thanks to the mulch placed around every tree in the Park. Thank you, Marshall, for your commitment to our neighborhood park!

Making sundaes appeared to be as fun for adults as it was for the neighborhood children.

Born in Lithuania, Gordon had immigrated to Galveston, then moved to Houston after the hurricane of 1900. In 1905 he opened a store that sold groceries, shoes and hardware - with \$400 in capital. His first jewelry store opened in 1916. (In the 1920s, he introduced the innovative option of buying jewelry on credit. In 1968, Gordon's Jewelers was the first jewelry store listed on the New York Stock Exchange. Gordon's became the second largest retail jewelry chain in the world and was bought out by its chief competitor, Zales. Today, Gordon's is a Zales brand. Gordon's sister Annie married Sam Finger, founder of Finger's Furniture.)



Ann Garnett and Terese Wagner stand in front of the Garnett home at 2337 Gramercy. Next door, at 2329 Gramercy, is the Wagner home (photo below). It has a unique history for Terese.

They bought it from Mr. Sheets' widow in 1992. Ann is our Republican Precinct Judge, and the portecochere at #2337 is frequently the polling place for Old Braeswood.

The Gordon House went through multiple owners. The current owners are Terese and Gary Wagner. They bought the house from art conservationist Carol Mancusi-Ungaro. Carol left Houston to become the founding director of the Center for Technical Study of Modern Art at the Harvard University Museums. Carol also is the director of conservation at the Whitney Museum of American Art in Manhattan.

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The two houses have a number of distinctive features not visible from the outside. The paneling is custom milled, and the woods change from room to room. The Sheets house had corkwood flooring, later removed because of the scarring from stiletto heels so popular in the 1950s. Cork remains in some of the closets. Mr. Sheets was a lover of gadgets and he used them throughout both houses. A movie screen that pulls down from the ceiling. A bar that is flush with the wall when not in use. A tea cart built into a cabinet for easy access. Clocks built into the walls. A third faucet at each sink to provide ice water cooled by the air conditioning system.

The current residents of the Sheets House are Ann and Joe Garnett.

HPD "Be Alert" Suggestions

Here's a set of shopping safety tips for the upcoming holiday season (courtesy of HPD):

- Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- If you must carry a purse, do not wrap the straps around your arms or shoulders. You could risk injury from a would-be purse snatcher. Carry a clutch purse tightly under your arm or wear a fanny pack.
- Do not carry wallets in a back pocket. It should be placed in a front pocket for safety.
- Be alert, criminals look for the "high dollar store" shopping bags with your purchases.
- Watch purchases while eating in mall food courts; bags as well as purses can easily be switched or taken.
- Educate your children about what to do if they are lost as well as what to do if a "stranger" should try and take them.
- Have your car keys ready in hand before leaving the store.
- Park in a high visibility area and check for lighting in case you leave during the hours of darkness.
- Before shopping, lock all your valuables in the trunk prior to parking in the parking lot.
- Walk briskly, confidently, and directly through the parking lot. Be cautious of people handing out fliers or asking questions in the parking area.
- Watch for people who may be following you. This can occur inside as well as outside the store. If you suspect that you are being followed, report it to the store or mall security. Report it immediately.
- Ask the mall security officer to escort you to your vehicle if you are uncomfortable.

3. Offer theater or sports tickets to someone who can use them
4. Find a good electrician, plumber, or painter
5. Notify neighbors about crime in the neighborhood as it occurs
6. Organize an impromptu get-together
7. Share resources during a power outage (Blackberry & i-Phone users)
8. Broadcast and discuss topics that are of interest to the group as a whole

The Group is open to anyone living within Old Braeswood. Because you must opt in to receive Group email messages, there is little risk of spam. You can adjust your personal settings to receive messages in real time, or in a daily or weekly "digest." If you find the Group is not for you, you can leave at any time.

As a group member, set your preferences to a) receive individual emails, b) receive special notices (as defined by the moderator), or c) not receive any emails at all (for this option, view the messages from the yahoo group home page at <http://groups.yahoo.com/group/OldBraeswoodNeighbors/>. Old Braeswood POA will continue to send electronic news and crime alerts. However, if you'd like the ability to have more interaction with your neighbors, the new Yahoo Group may be for you.

The story of how the Wagners bought the house is the story of two five-year-olds on the playground at the St. Vincent de Paul School. Sons of Ann and Terese, they started demanding play dates. Terese was surprised to see that Ann lived next door to the Gordon House, which had been Terese's childhood home.

After several years of play dates (including all 4 Garnett children and all 3 Wagner children), the Gordon House came onto the market in 2001. It was just as the Wagners were contemplating a move. Terese went inside for the first time in many years and was stunned by the quality of workmanship and the beauty of the materials used. Something she hadn't noticed as a child. None of the newer homes the Wagners had seen were built so well. It helped that the current owner was an art conservationist who had retrofitted the house, undoing every modernization imposed by prior residents, including Terese's parents. The Wagners bought it.

Today, the pantry still has pencil marks where Terese's parents measured her height as she grew up. Those marks are joined by pencil marks made by Carol Mancusi-Ungaro for her own children. And even more pencil marks record the growth progress of the Wagner children and of frequently visiting Garnett children.
