New Patrol Service and Vehicle For Old Braeswood! Neighborhood Support Needed For This Vital Service

Our new Patrol contract with SEAL Security service was officially launched on Wednesday, January 2, 2013. We hope you have had a chance to meet Officer Jim Wyatt, the SEAL security officer assigned to Old Braeswood for 40 hours a week. He drives and walks our streets at varying hours and days each week. Please take time to introduce yourself to him. He is eager to get to know everyone and is very willing to help neighbors feel safe and secure in our neighborhood.

SEAL Security solutions has a 24-hour Dispatcher: 713-422-2770. You may also call this number to request vacation watch or to report any suspicious activities. The dispatcher is in constant contact with Officer Wyatt, who patrols in a marked white SUV.

We encourage you to support the patrol service with your dues. If participation is high enough we hope to expanded the service to include additional hours.

This project is the result of many months of due diligence by the Safety & Security Committee, whose members considered a variety of options for replacing RACS, and eventually solicited requests for proposals, and conducted interviews of a half dozen highly recommended services. With many proposals in hand, they evaluated each one based on multiple factors, including training, experience, resources, and cost, conducting on site interviews to make the final selection.

The process was objective and data driven, as the committee reviewed crime data to get a better feel for where and when the resources would be most effective. It's important to know that Old Braeswood is overwhelmingly safe and secure, with very little crime. We do however have occasional property crimes like driveway thefts and burglaries throughout the year. The research revealed that the bulk of these crimes occur Monday through Fri-

day, from morning to afternoon, while many residents are at work. Highly visible security patrols during this block of time will serve to deter these types of crimes, and will hopefully make our neighborhood even safer.

The SEAL Officers are armed, private security contractors who provide value-added services such as vacation watch and phone dispatch. Their presence and ability to respond to calls immediately is a tremendous deterrent to crooks. The SEAL Officers are inside our neighborhood 100% of their time, and are accountable through GPS monitoring.

We believe that our dedicated officer from SEAL Security will provide a much higher level of service than we have had previously. We will be monitoring the results closely and reporting the performance to members on a regular basis.

This month's Garden Club speaker, Gary Moss, is the grandson of Peter and Julia Moss, who lived for many years in an early Old Braeswood house at 2246 Glen Haven Blvd. According to Stephen Fox's book Braeswood, An Architectural History, it was built on spec in 1930. The first owner was a Mary T. O'Riordan, widow of a John E. O'Riordan. She and her daughter, Mary, first appeared at that address in the City Directory for 1930-1. The second owner, William M. Loving and his wife Edna, moved to the house in 1935, and their son William M. Jr. lived in the garage apartment. Mr. Loving

owned rice mills. Then, in 1942, ownership changed to the Moss family.

Peter and Julia emigrated separately from Greece. Peter arrived through Ellis Island in 1915 from Koroni, a city in the Messenia region of Peloponnese. His original name.

"Mousouliotes", changed to the more pronounceable "Moss" when he became a citizen. The **Houston City Directory variously** listed him under his Greek name and under his American name, but never got the spelling of the Greek name quite right. Julia came from the Aegean island of Icaria in 1920 with her mother. It is Icaria where, by tradition, the mythical Icarus landed after the sun melted his wax wings and he fell to Earth.

Before buying a house in Old Braeswood, Peter and Julia also looked at other neighborhoods

and considered buying a house in Riverside Terrace (on Parkwood) or in River Oaks (on Inwood). Old Braeswood won because, at the time, the Glen Haven house sat on a double lot that occupied a corner, and Peter didn't like to "feel hemmed in."

Peter owned a block of land downtown where the Central Library now sits. Back then, it was separated from the Julia Ideson Library by a segment of Brazos St. On Peter's block was his restaurant Federal Grill, so named because the Federal Land Bank was on one side across Lamar St. His block also had a couple of apartment houses, a parking lot, and Houston's first Social Security office, built in 1937. The 1964 Directory lists Peter as president of the Chemical Building Corporation. He formed that company with the intent of building an 18-story building on the block, but the project fell through when the City refused him a permit. His site was across McKinney St. from City Hall and considered part of Civic Center.

Sunday dinners were a family affair. After their three sons were grown and there were daughters-in-law and grandchildren. Peter and Julia seated 10-14 at the table each week. Julia's traditional Greek dishes were favorites.

Their son Arthur, an architect, designed the Penguin Arms, one of the best surviving examples of Googie architecture, an exuberant mid-century style inspired by the Atomic Age. Built in 1950, it still stands at 2902 Revere St. Speculation is that the "Penguin" nickname came from the giant down-pointing triangles of green terrazzo tiles on the building's side.

Arthur's brother Phil joined him in real estate development. Arthur acted as architect and Phil as the businessman. They bought 12 acres on Westheimer and developed the Briargrove Shopping Center. In addition to this and other shopping centers, they developed various apartment buildings. Their brother Manuel worked for the City of Houston in the Department of Public Works.

Phil's son Gary, who grew up enjoying Julia's Sunday dinners in Old Braeswood, is today the owner of Moss Landscaping, with many neighborhood clients.

Julia, widowed in 1971, remained in the house. It was sold by her estate to Stephen Barrett in 1995. He works for FMC Technologies Inc., an oil services company, as Director of Global Subsea Product Lines. He currently lives there with his wife, Sheryl, and their son Brendan.

Reminder: No Yard Sales or Garage Sales in Old Braeswood

Some of you may not know that our deed restrictions were put in place more than 85 years ago to ensure that Old Braeswood remains an enjoyable place in which to live. Among the many rules in our deed restrictions are prohibitions against commercial use of property and signs. All types of commercial activity including yard sales and garage sales are prohibited. In short, any commercial activity to which the general public is invited is not allowed. Following this rule keeps traffic out of the neighborhood, making our streets safer. It also ensures criminals are not invited in to the neighborhood to case homes.

There are many alternatives to yard and garage sales that we encourage you to consider. Many charities would love to have your unwanted items and that will haul them off and will leave you with a tax receipt. There are also estate sale firms that will sell your items offsite.

Park Corporation Appreciation

Special thanks to this year's Park Patrons! These neighbors have made donations during 2012. Garden Club News

The Old Braeswood Garden Club welcomed speaker Gary Moss, owner of Moss Landscaping, at its monthly meeting in January at the home of Maribel Reuter. Growing up, Gary lived west of downtown Houston, but ate Sunday dinner each week at the Old Braeswood home of his grandparents on Glen Haven. Gary has spoken in the past to Old Braeswood neighbors, and the Garden Club was eager to have him back.

As usual, Gary brought with him a wealth of information for gardening in our special climate and with our special soil. Just a few nuggets:

When building or renovating, do not allow workers to park within the drip line of your trees. Doing so will compact the soil. Also, motor vehicles may drip oil that will get into the soil and damage the trees.

The brass PVB (Pressure Vacuum Breaker) on your irrigation system is a target for

thieves who can sell it for scrap metal. They typically tie it to a vehicle and pull it out, leaving you (probably while you are away from home) with a water geyser. If your PVB is in front, hide it behind a potted plant.

The cost of installing a dedicated irrigation water meter is recouped by savings on your water bill. The time needed to recoup varies depending on the size of your yard and the amount of your usage, but typically it occurs in 2 to 3 years.

After pruning branches from your trees and bushes, clean the pruner with alcohol to pre-

vent any contamination from disease or infestation to spread to other plants when you reuse the pruner.

Place your household garbage in the city provided automated bin or recycling containers on the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. the evening preceding pick up and no later than 7 a.m. the day of pick up, and remove it no later than 10 p.m. on collection day. Bins left on the street beyond these times are subject to city fines. Bins must be accessible to the automated collection truck (not blocked by vehicles, trees, etc).

Yard waste must be bagged in city approved biodegradable bags, weighing no more than 50 pounds, and placed at the curb at least 3' away from automated bins. Yard waste mixed with paper, plastic or any other type of waste will not be collected. Small branches may be put in bundles (no more than 4' in length and no more than 18" in diameter).

Heavy Trash/Junk Waste Collection Moves to the 3rd Friday of Each Month

Please remember that the city now collects heavy trash (junk & tree waste) on the third Friday of each month. Tree debris only is collected in odd numbered months, and junk waste only is collected in even numbered months. You may leave large limbs out every month. If you have trouble remembering which month is tree waste only, think of January as the month when you can leave your Christmas tree out for collection and count from there. You can also call 311 or visit www.houstontx.gov/solidwaste/schedule.html to check the schedule.

Be sure to place your heavy trash times at the curb by 7 a.m. on the collection day. And call 311 immediately in case of missed pick up.

Monthly Patrol Report

During his first month on the job, Officer Wyatt stayed very busy. His activities are detailed in daily logs that are shared with our security committee. His daily log entries have included: investigating suspicious vehicles and persons in the neighborhood and asking them to leave if they have no legitimate business here; chasing off solicitors; logging license plate numbers of suspicious vehicles; vacation watch service and checking homes three times per day; meeting nearly 100 neighbors in person and getting to know who belongs in the neighborhood and who does not; responding to dozens of calls for assistance; checking out front doors left wide open and securing swinging gates; reporting 311 issues; welcoming new neighbors when they move in and presenting them with patrol service information.

To date we have received patrol dues from over 100 neighbors, but for this program to continue and to be successful, we need over 200 families to contribute. Please encourage your friends and neighbors in Old Braeswood to support the Patrol service with their annual patrol dues of \$300. Reminder notices have been included in this mailing for households that have not yet contributed. If no form was included, your patrol dues have been received.

We strongly encourage you to call the new Patrol at 713-422-2770 whenever you see suspicious activity. Program the dispatch number into your cell phones and call when you see suspicious activity or to request vacation watch. We want you to be convinced that this valuable service is well worth paying for. Please give them a try, and if you agree that they are providing great service, send in your patrol dues of \$300 payable to OBPOA and mail to PO Box 541346, Houston, TX 77254. Please do your part by helping prevent crime before it occurs. Officer Wyatt is a great crime deterrent, but residents must also do their part by following common sense crime prevention rules. Please remember to lock your doors and windows and set your alarm when leaving your home. Close gates. Don't let papers or FedEx deliveries build up on your lawn and porch while you are away (a clear signal that no one is at home). Always turn on your porch lights at night.

Shooting of jogger on January 25 likely gang related The shooting of an unarmed resident who was on an early morning jog on January 25, 2013, has left our neighborhood reeling and police struggling for answers about a crime with no motive.

The victim, who was shot in the legs at 5:30 a.m. as a dark colored vehicle passed by on Bellefontaine, is recovering. Special thanks to the neighbors who raced to the man's aid and called 911. Police currently believe that this incident was random and that it was probably a gang initiation ritual.

This incident was also extremely alarming to SEAL, our new security service, which responded immediately and proactively by sending nine armed officers to patrol our streets over the weekend after the incident. These officers began their vigil at 5:30 a.m. on January 26 along with one trained patrol dog. They walked abreast down the middle of our streets and were followed by 5 security vehicles which drove up and down all of our streets for an hour. This service was provided at no additional cost to our neighborhood.
