Greenbriar Drive Update

Council Member Ellen Cohen has informed us that Greenbriar Drive, from Rice Blvd. to Holcombe, will receive an asphalt overlay in the next 12 months. Some sections will need a more significant repair which may involved repair of the collapsed subgrade. For years this street has been in line, off and on, for full reconstruction, but funding hasn't been available. Ms. Cohen is trying to secure the necessary funding through the city's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for a full reconstruction in the next few years. The reconstruction project would include the segment from Holcombe to Main Street through Old Braeswood. Some years ago our association fought to reduce the right-of-way on Greenbriar to prevent future widening. We will continue to monitor the project to ensure our segment is repaired at the current street width.

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Many Old Braeswood families have multiple generations living in different neighborhood houses simultaneously, but only one has four generations living on the same street. Dorothy Minchen (Schaffer), her son Don, her grandson Josh, and her great-grandson Jacob live in houses on two blocks of Maroneal.

The Schaffers' connection to Old Braeswood began in 1954 when Dr. Randy Schaffer, a founder of Texas Children's Hospital and Chair of Pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine, moved his family from the Museum District to 2530 Maroneal. His wife, Dorothy, still lives in that house. Their boys (Randy Jr., Don, and Kent) grew up playing every kind of ball game in the Triangle, now Braeswood Park. (The Schaffer boys were joined by a sister, Sandi.) A solidly hit ball could fly across yards and all the way down the street, because there were smaller and fewer trees then.

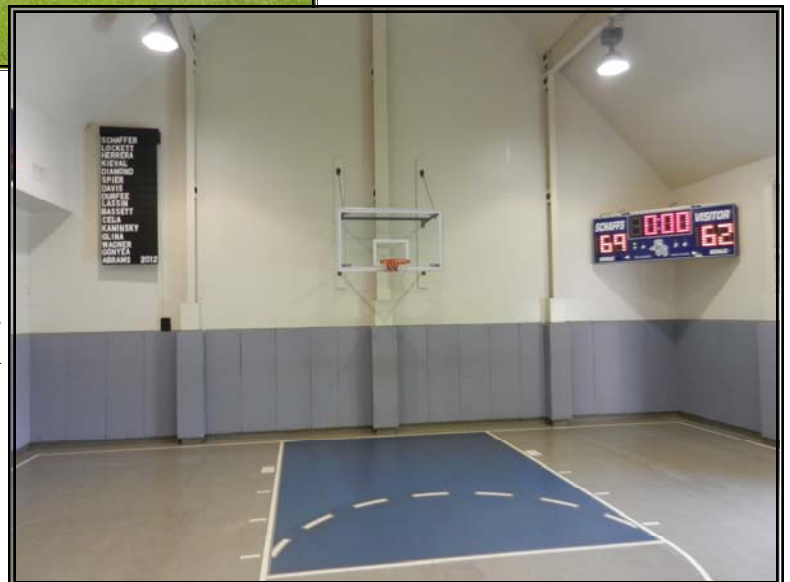
Dr. Schaffer is remembered as "Old School." He not only made house calls at night, but if he were called out of bed to see a sick child only two doors down, he would dress in a suit and tie and drive the short distance to park in their drive, making a formal arrival. (That happened.)

Two of the boys returned to live in Old Braeswood. Don Schaffer, a pediatrician like his Dad, lives with his wife, Barbie, at 2348 Maroneal, across the street from his old ball field. Randy Jr., a criminal defense lawyer who trained with Racehorse Haynes, lives with his wife, Mollie, at 2233 Glen Haven, a distant one block from Maroneal. Mollie and Randy have two sons. However, it is their son Josh, who practices law with his father and lives with his wife, Emily,

at 2409 Maroneal. Josh and Emily have a son, Jacob (aged two years), who is the fourth generation of Schaffers on that street.

But this is the story of the house built on Glen Haven by Randy and Mollie Schaffer. They are committed Houstonians, meeting right after high school during summer jobs at Texas Children's hospital, marrying a year later, and spending only seven years of married life away from Houston, to complete school. In 1996, their family had outgrown their patio home and they were ready to build. It had to be in Old Braeswood. And it had to be near Maroneal.

The southeast corner of Glen Haven and Greenbriar was a large vacant lot that was platted in the original plan for Section One, then purchased by an Old Braeswood couple for one of their children, and never built upon. It was large enough to accommodate Mollie and Randy's dream home, but its title was in a generation skipping trust with many grandchildren heirs



scattered across the United States. Everyone's signature was needed. Everyone had to be found.

The actual building of the house was no easier. Working with architect Tom Wilson, they developed a plan. They agreed that the house should have both a hill country ambience and expanses of glass. The plan called for lots of limestone, forklifted into the house for walls, floors, and two fireplaces. The rock was pulled to the scale they specified. One fireplace mantel needed a piece of limestone so large that the quarry called to say they couldn't supply it,

then called back later when they'd hit a new vein yielding a piece over 1.5 tons. It was exactly what was needed. Mollie further stipulated that the interior materials have a "contemporary edginess." (Her kitchen counters are poured concrete ridged in forged steel.) She made sure they had a large screened porch behind the living quarters. Randy's only requirement was an indoor basketball court.

The basketball court defines the house. It has bleachers. It has an electric scoreboard. It has a posted roster of official players. It has a water fountain. It has air conditioning. And the completed basketball court was inaugurated in grand style. Randy invited every man who had played ball with him as a boy, as well as the parents of all those former playmates. The guests were drawn from early Old Braeswood families: Leavitts, Perlmutter, Gerbers, Dailys, Kaminskys, and others. Mollie and Randy had assembled a photo display of many, many Old Braeswood ball games from the 1950s.

Since then, the tradition lives on. Randy hosts basketball games on Saturday mornings, keeping his indoor court in use. He acts as Commissioner of the Schaffer League and confers player awards at an annual restaurant banquet.

And one more thing. Mollie and Randy make their broad, grassy lawn available to little boys on their block looking for a place to throw a ball.

Stop Feeding Feral Cats & Please Adopt a Kitten

All residents are asked to immediately cease feeding feral cats. BARC (the city's Bureau of Animal Regulation & Control) is in the process of trapping feral cats in the 2500 blocks of Dorrington and Gramercy. But the cats will not seek the food in the traps if neighbors continue to feed them.

In addition, a petite woman with a slight Asian appearance has been seen releasing the cats and leaving large bags of food for them in several driveways at the west end of Dorrington. The woman drives a white truck. If you see anyone feeding the cats, please get their license plates and a description and report this information to Old Braeswood POA.

The population explosion began a few months back with a well-intentioned neighbor feeding stray cats. The population is about 55 as of Sept. 1. Over 35 kittens have gone to BARC for adoption and 15 adults have been spayed/neutered and released. Another 25-30 adults need to be caught and spayed or neutered.



Volunteers on Dorrington are assisting in the trapping effort and would appreciate loaner *cat traps*. Donations for spaying and neutering fostered kittens are also needed. If you can help, please **contact the OB office at 713-807-1787 or info@oldbraeswood.com**. BARC operates a catch and release program. Cats that are trapped are spayed, neutered, vaccinated, and released back into the area.

Kittens from this colony that are currently being fostered will be available for adoption soon. There are two darling Siamese kittens and one black kitten — all are females — that are ready to be placed. Please contact the office if you are interested in adopting a kitten. BARC has many of the older kittens.

West Nile Update

Old Braeswood POA is following the West Nile mosquito situation and we wanted to arm you with the latest information. Harris County Mosquito Control assures us that they are taking appropriate measures to protect county residents where the virus is being found and to provide information about how we can protect ourselves.

Mosquito traps are in every zip code in Harris County. These traps suck up mosquitoes, and when the traps are full, they are collected and the mosquitoes are checked for the virus. The County's efforts to continually pinpoint virus outbreaks include the frequent testing of both dead and live birds (after having blood drawn, the live birds are released).

You can check locations where the virus has been detected by visiting www.hcphe.org/mc under menu items "Current Disease Activity" and "Proposed Treatment." All zip codes where the virus has been found are listed. There is also a schedule showing when and where chemical treatments, ground and aerial, are being administered. Old Braeswood's zip code is 77030. Surrounding area zip codes include: 77004, 77005, 77021, 77025, and 77054.

The County says that indiscriminate treatment/spraying may build resistance in the mosquito population. Therefore, the County is administering ground and aerial treatment only in those areas where the virus has actually been found. Residents can help reduce the mosquito population by emptying containers around their yards. Rice Centennial Celebration — Rice Celebrates! You Can Too !!

This is Rice University's centennial year, and you don't have to be a Rice graduate to join the celebration. It has been an ongoing party of events all year, with a concentration of events in October. Many events are open to the public, giving Old Braeswood residents a chance to show their support for their institutional neighbor and to have fun at the same time. The **Shepherd School of Music** will present a replica concert of the string quartet performance at Rice Institute's opening back in 1912. You can hear it Sat., Oct 6, at 3pm in Stude Concert Hall. Seating is free. First come, first served.

Another concert at Stude Concert Hall will feature the Shepherd School Symphony Orchestra's world premiere of a symphony by William Bolcom, commissioned in honor of the Centennial. The program also includes works by Rachmaninoff, Paganini, and Sibelius. Hear it on October 11th, 12th or 14th at 7:30 p.m.

Shepherd faculty talent is on display Sunday, October 14th, at Alice Pratt Brown Hall, between 2:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. Norman Fischer, Herbert S. Autrey Professor of Cello, and Jeanne Kierman Fischer, Artist Teacher of Piano, present a recital of works written by current and former Shepherd School Faculty composers.

A good way to see the Rice campus is to join one of the **Centennial Walking Tours**. The tours highlight Rice's architecture, public art program, and sustainability programs. Meet on Wednesday, October 10th, or Thursday, October 11th, or Friday, October 12th. Tours leave Brochstein Pavillion on those dates every 15 minutes between 2:00 pm and 4:00 pm. The same tour is duplicated on Saturday, October 13th, at a different time. The Saturday tours leave from Brochstein Pavillion between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m.

A **new work of outdoor art** for the Rice campus is unveiled on Saturday, October 13th, at 10:30 a.m. on the Keck Hall (old chemistry building) lawn. It is sculptor Bruce Wolfe's statue of Rice's founding president, Edgar Odell Lovett.

Owl fans can celebrate at the **Homecoming football game** in Rice Stadium on Saturday, October 13th, 2:30 p.m. – 6:30 p.m. The Rice Owls take on the UT-San Antonio Roadrunners in this Centennial Celebration/Homecoming game.

Buy a Centennial book and bring it to an **author's book signing** at Brochstein Pavillion on Friday, October 12th, between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. There are nine books to choose from: four histories of Rice and biographies of William Marsh Rice, Edgar Odell Lovett (2), Captain James A. Who doesn't enjoy a **sound and light show**? You don't have to wait until next July 4th. Rice will host four in October on the Academic Quadrangle. These are the dates and times:

In 1912, illustrious guests from around the world attended Rice's opening at the invitation of President Lovett. In October, Rice will host illustrious speakers for its centennial. The **Centennial Lecture Series** will include Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr. (U.S. Supreme Court), Esther Dyson (international angel investor), Shirley Ann Jackson (physicist and President of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute), Rem Koolhaas (Pritzker Prize-winning architect) and J. Craig Venter (human genome pioneer). Registration for this series will be open to the public beginning October 1st. The lectures will take place on October 10th, 11th and 17th. President David W. Leebron's address both recalling of Edgar Odell Lovett's address at the opening of Rice Institute and addressing Rice's present and future as well. It will be preceded by an academic procession with representatives of universities from around the world. This will be on Friday, October 12th, 9:30 a.m. – 11:15 a.m., Academic Quadrangle.

Finally, hear from promising Rice students at a presentation of their research posters highlighting undergraduate and graduate student work in virtually all fields of study at Rice University. Friday, October 12th, at 1 p.m. – 4 p.m., Grand Hall, Rice Memorial Center.

According to the latest monthly data prepared by the Houston Association of REALTORS® (HAR), single-family home sales rose 14.4 % compared to June 2011. This makes June 2012 the 13th consecutive month of positive sales. The month also saw local housing inventory hold to its lowest level in more than five years. In its July economic outlook, the Greater Houston Partnership said 'Houston is the strongest of all the major metro economies in the U.S., and if job growth continues at the current pace, this may be one of the best years on record for the region.'"

The June inventory of single-family homes held at the 5.5 months level it reached in May, which is the lowest level the Houston market has seen since March 2007. In June 2011, inventory stood at 7.9 months. It has remained below a six-month supply since December 2011. The 5.5-month figure compares favorably to the national inventory of single-family homes of 6.6 months recently reported by the National Association of REALTORS (NAR). This demonstrates that Houston continues to outpace the current US housing recovery.

This gate near the Watts intersection has very limited visibility, unlike other gates around the Roberts campus. The main gate further North on Greenbriar will remain open, as will other entrances to the School and Spark Park. Roberts is sorry for the inconvenience, but this change is for the good of the children.
