From its beginning, the house at 2307 Blue Bonnet Blvd. had celebrity status. It was built in 1955 for attorney Gerald S. Gordon and his wife, Lilliann, and they went all out. Their chosen architects were none other than Howard Barnstone and Preston M. Bolton. Yale trained Barnstone counted Dominique de Menil among his patrons and was instrumental in bringing the modernist style of Mies van der Rohe to Houston. Barnstone would later work with Mark Rothko in designing the Rothko Chapel. Bolton, son of a Texas A&M president and himself trained at A&M, cofounded Houston Ballet, and led the Alley Theatre (president of the Board) and Theatre Under the Stars (chair of the Board). Together, they earned 16 IAI Houston awards. Like many of their projects, the Blue Bonnet

house was showcased in national magazines, appearing on the covers of *Architectural Record* (Mid-May 1956) and *House and Garden* (January 1958).

That was just the outside of the house. For the interior, the Gordons used architect Florence Knoll, a student of both Mies van der Rohe and Eliel Saarinen. Her furniture was an expression of their minimalist, rationalist design theories. Landscaping was not forgotten. They hired Harvard trained Thomas Church, who practiced out of San Francisco. A pioneer of the "California Style" of gardens, he was renowned for "outdoor rooms," areas for outdoor living within the landscape as a whole.

Rice University professor Stephen Fox has written repeatedly about the Gordon house, extensively so in his book *Braeswood, an Architectural History*. For Fox, the Gordon house is a key contribution to Old Braeswood's





tradition of architecturally important houses.

Happily, the Gordons were able to enjoy their extraordinary house for many years. Lillian remained until her death in 1991, and Gordon, whose legal career in Houston spanned 60 years, remained in the house until a couple of years before his death in 2003. Their daughters Stephanie and Leslie grew up there. Like many of their neighbors, the Gordons were members of Temple Beth Israel.

Following the Gordons in 2001 were Diane Tanking and Blanten Filak, who remain in the house today. Diane, whose career has been in health care executive search, was raised in Kansas and Nebraska. Blanten, whose work has been in telecom sales and real estate development, was raised in Dallas. They met on an airplane and became engaged at the top of

the Eiffel Tower, so, of course, their first home in Houston had to be in a highrise. They might still be living in the sky but for a comment made by Blanten's then 7-year-old son, "Why can't we live in a gound house?" A search began and Old Braeswood came into the picture. They chose the Gordon House without even knowing its illustrious history. Its stunning design was preserved intact, without the awkward modifications that marked so many of the houses they had seen in Southampton and Southgate. Their story is another example of how the architecture in Old Braeswood draws people to our neighborhood.

Three Original Old Braeswood Houses Are Preserved


Preserving the character of the neighborhood by preserving its original houses is always an ongoing effort.


Currently, three exceptional houses are in the process of renovation. You may have passed them. If not, be sure to enjoy watching the progress on:

7319 Greenbriar Dr. (the subject of an article in the July/ August 2011 newsletter), 2115 Glen Haven Blvd. (the former home of Governor William P. Hobby and his wife, Oveta Culp Hobby, first secretary of the US Department of Health, Education and Welfare, first director of the Women's Army Corps, and a chairperson of the board of the Houston Post), and 2215 Glen Haven Blvd. (the subject of an article in the June/July 2014 newsletter). In each instance, the new owners are modernizing inside, but allowing the exterior to retain its historic Old Braeswood look.

Board Member Spotlight: Sally Miller



Report Street Light Outrages

Well-lighted streets contribute to the security of the neighborhood. Please report any streetlight that is not functioning. As a reminder, 311 is NOT the correct number to dial when making a streetlight report. It is CenterPoint Energy that maintains streetlights throughout our electric service territory.

Before making your report, look for a pole number on the streetlight and write it down. If it does not have one, then note the exact location of the streetlight. Then make the report either by telephone (713-207-2222) or online at http://www.centerpointenergy.com/services/electricity/residential/reportastreetlightoutage/

Trash & Recycling Schedule

Recycling Every other Tuesday

Dates July 14 & 21 Aug. 11 & 25

Sept 8 & 22 Oct. 6 & 20

Household TrashTuesdays (in city provided bins)Yard WasteTuesdays (in biodegradable bags)Tree Limbs & Debris3rd Monday (in Odd months)Junk Waste3rd Monday (in Even months)

Place your household garbage in the city provided automated bin or recycling containers, and set them on the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. the evening preceding pick up and no later than 7 a.m. the day of pick up, and remove it no later than 10 p.m. on collection day. Bins left on the street beyond these times are subject to city fines. Bins must be accessible to the automated collection truck (not blocked by vehicles, trees, etc).

Yard waste must be bagged in city approved biodegradable bags, weighing no more than 50 pounds, and placed at the curb at least 3' away from automated bins. Yard waste mixed with paper, plastic or any other type of waste will not be collected. Small branches may be put in bundles (no more than $4 \, \text{ft.} \, x \, 18$ inches in diameter).

Street Trees Need Watering During Hot Summer Months

The beautiful allee of street trees planted down Morningside this past spring are in need of regular watering. The recent hot temperatures in the first half of July and lack of rain have been a shock to their systems.

If you have a new tree that is turning brown, please water it immediately. The tree will often drop its leaves to conserve water and will sprout new leaves once regular watering and/or rains resume.

The young trees that were just planted would benefit from daily watering of 1-2 gallons in this heat. Water can be applied directly to the root ball mound near the trunk. If using a garden hose, test the water temperature to ensure no scalding water is hiding in the garden hose.
