Old Braeswood covers several distinctly different sections. They vary from one another because they were developed in different decades, each with a different prevailing architectural style and also varying deed restrictions. Section one, bounded by South Main, Maroneal and Kirby was developed primarily in the 1930s. Tudor and Georgian houses were popular and the deed restrictions for that section include a requirement that houses have a second story. When residential construction resumed after the lull during World War II, the one-story ranch house had become the popular style, and Section II, bounded by

Sociology. Paddy was an artist who later would be featured in the December 1, 1996 issue of *Houston Business Journal* under the title *Disney Designer: Paddy Gordon has had a Cinderella career marketing Mickey Mouse as a leather art form*. The Journal credited her with having “an international reputation” and for “creating some of the most unique furniture sold by Disney, Warner Brothers Inc. and MGM Studios.”

In 1977 the Gordons sold to physician Dr. William T. Conner and his wife Barbara, who stayed until 1983. Then, the City Directory lists “Tenenbaum” (without a first name) for 1984 and shows the house as vacant in 1985. There is hearsay that it was briefly owned by Louis Tenenbaum, founder of Tenenbaum Jewelers. But the nature of the Tenenbaum connection to the house is uncertain.

The 1986 Directory shows the house sold to Richard B. and Bayle Drubel, who stayed until 1993. Richard was a partner in the law firm of Susman Godfrey, specializing in commercial litigation. After leaving Old Braeswood, he became a partner in Boies, Schiller &

Flexner and moved with Bayle to Hanover, New Hampshire. They chose Hanover for gardening. Like Paddy Gordon, they also were featured in a magazine - *New Hampshire Home*, May-June 2013. Richard is quoted as



Maroneal, Kirby and Bellefontaine, was not deed restricted from embracing that style. Two houses, however, represent a marriage between Section I and Section II. And as with any wedding, there is a wedding cake of sorts.

“Wedding Cake” Houses

If you drive past 2314 Blue Bonnet, you will see a ranch house with a smaller second story set in the middle, much like a wedding cake with the “groom’s cake” on top. You might think that the house was originally a classic ranch house and that the owner at some point added on the top layer to have more room. But then, if you happen to drive Glen Haven and see a very similar house at 2436 Glen Haven, you might wonder how it happened that two home owners both added the same unusual addition. The answer is that the two houses were built in the 1950s. Each followed the architectural style popular at that time, but were designed with a “groom’s cake” to fulfill the deed restriction requiring a second story.

The Glen Haven house was built by home developer Joe M. Edelman in 1955 for himself and wife Eleanor and they moved in the following year. In about 1970 they sold to Chad and Paddy Gordon. Chad was a professor at Rice University, recruited from Harvard to become the first Chair of Rice’s Department of

The departure of the Drubels brings us to the current owner, Evelyn Stewart. She is now the second owner with a connection to Rice University. She became Controller of Rice in 1993 and looked for a house close to work. Big lots and big trees attracted her to Old Braeswood. In 2003 she retired from Rice, but her relationship to OB continues.

The house at 2314 Blue Bonnet was built in about 1954, but it is still occupied by one of its original residents, Lorraine Kristal. In 1955, she moved in as a child and grew up there, attending Roberts Elementary from first through fifth grades. Living with her were parents Herman and Sylvia Kristal and brother Ira. The family came from the Stella Link area, attracted by schools and the character of the neighborhood. Herman Kristal owned Kristal Real Estate, a collection of residential rental properties that began with inherited properties and then grew as he added to them.

Lorraine is now retired from teaching third grade and ESL. The last 25 years of that career were back at Roberts Elementary. She inherited the house in 2002 from her mother, who had lived there as a widow since 1983, and Lorraine moved back in.

It has been Old Braeswood tradition for those growing up here to return. Lorraine didn't just add to that tradition, she doubled it by returning not only to her old house, but also to her old school.

OB Book Club News

Start reading *The Power of Now: A Guide to Spiritual Enlightenment* by Eckhart Tolle to prepare for the September 12th meeting at the home of Ann Garnett. Ball Moss Can Harm Trees

Last fall, the crape myrtles surrounding the Park became infested with ball moss (*Tillandsia recurvata*), which is not really a moss, nor is it officially a parasite that kills trees. However, this bromeliad is an epiphyte that attaches to other plants but does not sap nutrients. Instead, ball moss feeds off nutrients and moisture in the air. However, ball moss can create significant problems for trees because the plan encircles branches with its tendrils called “hold fasts.” As hold fasts tighten their grip to support larger balls, they reduce circulation to the end of the branch. Weak branches, or those overloaded with ball moss, may die. Ball moss produces seed year-round. Birds and winds drop seed into bark crevices.

Healthy trees can handle ball moss just fine. It’s unsightly but not a threat. Already-weak trees, however, may be stressed to the point where they become more susceptible to fatal insects or disease.

Trees with ball moss should be watched closely. If the moss begins to take over, the tufts within reach should be removed, sealed in plastic and thrown away. For severe infestations, contact you’re the county extension office for suggested treatments. Search for [Texas AgriLife Extension Service](#).

You can also spray infested trees with a baking soda mix (40 pounds of baking soda per 100 gallons of water). Water well before you begin to ensure absorption of the baking soda. Failure to water first will significantly reduce effectiveness of this treatment.

Place household garbage and recycling in city-provided wheeled containers and set them on the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. the evening preceding pick up. Remove bins no later than 10 p.m. on collection day. Bins left on the street beyond these times are subject to city fines. Bins must be accessible to the automated collection truck (not blocked by vehicles, trees, etc). Yard waste must be bagged in city approved biodegradable bags, weighing no more than 50 pounds, and placed at the curb at least 3’ away from automated bins. Yard waste mixed with paper, plastic or any other type of waste will not be collected. Small branches may be put in bundles (no more than 4 ft. x 18 inches in diameter).
